COUNTY HUNTING

Dick Neumann W9JR is an avid County Hunter. We asked Dick to tell us about this part of his ham radio life. This is Part II of his story which began last month.

THE WHOLE BALL OF WAX

Some County Hunters are really serious about this hobby, and have gotten the WBOW (Whole Ball of Wax) multiple times. I wondered how they were able to do that because I was teaching full time, and was only able to be at the radio in the evenings and weekends. Later, when I retired, I learned the secret of the WBOW...spend all day making and logging county contacts! Some specialize by going the route using only SSB. Or CW. I was doing it mixed... SSB and/or CW. I received my first USA-CA #969 on Feb. 22, 1999. That means it took me several years to obtain my goal. My second USA-CA #393 came two years ago on September 18, 2009, a considerably shorter time.

DF3CB - Hams Giving Back



Bernd Koch DF3CB has been a licensed amateur radio operator since 1977. In these 34 years as a ham, he has achieved a significant record as a Contester and DX operator. From his station in Munich, Germany, he has DXCC Honor Roll Mixed (349); Phone (348), CW (348, needing P5) and RTTY (343).

Bernd says that 99% of his operating is CW. He has worked all 40 zones on 160 meters and has 34

zones on 6 meters. The current DF3CB radio station, located in Munich, Germany, has three towers and ten HF/6m antennas.

At the age of 12, Bernd's parents DF3CP and DL1MAO, asked whether he wanted to join them in learning ham radio. They joined the Deutsche Amateur-Radio-Club (DARC) and studied for their licenses in a course offered by the local club. he was fascinated by CW and learned it in weeks. It wasn't long before his Dad bought an HF receiver, which he claimed as his own. I had to two years before the German license regulations allowed him to take the license exam. In the interim, he listened to the HF bands and sent SWL cards. He was licensed as soon as regulations allowed. His first goal was 5 Band DXCC! It took a few years but he did it with 100 watts. Next he built an amplifier and installed Yagis and an inverted Vee for 160 to 40. With these antennae he attained second place in Europe in the CQWW Single Op Assisted category twice.

Bernd is giving back to amateur radio. He develops software for amateur radio purposes. On his website, he offers four programs. He has BV, a professional software package for QSL Management and Label or QSL Printing.

It is mainly designed for the contester and QSL manager, but is useful for other QSL'ing purposes as well. Fast Log Entry is a program that creates ADIF files from manually entered QSO records. This is useful if you couldn't take a logging computer on your DXpedition. Alpha 87A Control Software to fully operate the amplifier via software. Finally, he offers FT2000RC for the YAESU FT-2000. AUGUST ACTIVE FOR OTVARC

August turned out to be one of the more active months for club activities and projects. The Annual Picnic and Ice Cream Social at Rood Bridge Park in Hillsboro was a great success.



This “watermelon art” by Rosalind Kane, XYL for Phil K2ASP, caught everyone’s attention. A purely social activity, the Picnic and Ice Cream Social has become a highlight event. This year we had perfect weather.

Saturday, August 20, saw the Club Trailer in action as the center of our Summer NAQP effort. Parked in the parking lot of a Hillsboro light-industrial park, OTVARC’s Contest Group fielded a Multi-Operator Two-Transmitter entry. The team used a club-owned Yaesu 840 transceiver on 40 meters and a brand new Icom 7410, owned by Joe Kelly N7BF, on 20 meters. See Joe’s story on this transceiver elsewhere in this issue. Hamstick Dipoles were used on both bands until afternoon, when Steve Jackson KD7ABE erected his portable Super Antenna 3-element beam for the 20 meter station. We had we had seven operators in the log and worked a total of 33 states and three Canadian provinces. Joe worked all the DX: New Zealand and Kaliningrad.

Finally, the third Fifth Wednesday Contest on August 31st drew twelve stations in the hour-long session. Our next Fifth Wednesday will be on November 30th.

W7OTV FIELD DAY COMPARISONS

Field Day has many measures of success. Fielding an operation off-the-grid in a quasi-emergency style is one. Generating a good turn-out of members, family supporters, and members of the general public is another.

Field Day is not a contest, but we do keep score. We compare our scores with similar operations by other clubs and groups. The most important comparison is with ourselves. In participation and in score, we want to learn and improve our operation. Here is a look at our last six year’s effort with 3A in 2006, 2007, and 2008, and 4A in 2009, 2010, and this year. Note that our best score in number of QSOs took place in 2009, our first year as a 4A operation. However, our best year in points was this year. We made a significant effort at earning bonus points this year.

making all contacts with mobiles in their 18-wheelers, all YL's, all OM/YL couples, plus other interesting awards. I received my BINGO #313 award on October 6, 2009. What is BINGO, you ask? BINGO is the word used by CH'ers to identify the MASTER COUNTY HUNTER. This means that a ham going for this award must make a two-way radio contact with a ham in a county whose first initial is in the suffix of CH'er. For instance, my call is W9JR. If I was mobile in my county, Richland Wisconsin, I would qualify as a BINGO contact because I have R in my call suffix. If it was in Juneau County, I would qualify because I have J in my suffix. And so on around the country. Wherever I was in a county whose name started with a J or an R, I would qualify as a BINGO contact for the person seeking the BINGO award.

So, I went through my logbook to check on the call signs of mobiles to determine if they were in a county whose name started with the letter that correlated with a letter in their call sign. We have "wild cards". If the mobile has an X in their call sign, that person is good for BINGO in ANY county. That is pretty cool, because I had many contacts with hams having an X in their call.

Yep! I was now listening for mobile hams in counties that began with a letter in their call suffix, and for those having an X in their call. That added intrigue to my hunt. Today with many online logging programs it all became just a bit easier. Another "wild card" is making a mobile contact with another ham already having a USA-CA number. Fun, right?

Obtaining the WBOW for BINGO took a few years to accomplish, and I was very happy when my Master County Hunter (BINGO) award was issued on October 6...my birthday.

Now I am trying for a USA-CA 3rd time by making a two-way PSK31 contact with hams in all 3,077 counties of the U.S. I have been told that this is a very ambitious project...but I am accepting the challenge and will continue my quest whether I finish this one or not. It's great fun and very rewarding. My logbook lists 543 PSK31 contacts to date...I still have a long way to go.

County Hunting is a fascinating part of my amateur radio hobby, but I must warn you...IT IS ADDICTING...because the more county contacts you get, the more you want. There are many ham contests and "contesters", but County Hunting is not a contest...you can take as much time as you want to accomplish your goal. That suited me just fine.

Irma Bombeck once said, "The measure of achievement is not winning awards, it is doing something that you appreciate, something you believe is worthwhile." What she said is absolutely perfect for those ham radio operators seeking the WBOW...their USA-CA number. Good luck!
